Condo Notes

Announcements: At the May 11 board meeting we accepted the resignation of Brad Williams as our board member/treasurer. Brad's position will be filled by Penny Pershey. Penny has prior experience as a member of the HOA board, and Don, Elaine and I welcome her to the Highland Park Board of Directors. I want to personally thank Brad for his two plus years of volunteer service to our community through his work as a board member and as a volunteer on the landscape and finance committees. Unfortunately, our newest board mem-Jeanine Hickman, ber, also tendered her resignation by email on April 27. We urgently need to fill this open position with another volunteer who can serve as secretary. We need somebody who can take notes at meetings and then produce the minutes as either an M/S Word or Google document. Please contact Zoe Allen, another board member or our property manager, Erin Ashley if you can volunteer. In the event nobody is willing to join our board at this time, we would gladly accept a computer literate person who can attend our monthly meetings, take notes and produce the minutes. There would be no obligation to attend other meetings, receive board emails, etc.

Dryer Vents: Letters were mailed on May 10 to all unit owners who did not comply with the board directive to have their dryer vents cleaned. We do expect all owners to comply and you have **until July 1 to do so**.

Smoking: Your board members met with L. Stephen Russell, Attorney-at-Law, prior to our regular board meeting on May 11. Mr. Russell is an acknowledged expert on smoking issues and rules when it comes to condo associations. Our next step will be to schedule a late afternoon or evening special meeting of the condo homeowners, possibly in late June or early July. This will be an informational meeting where questions can be asked and answered and opinions can be expressed. This meeting will be a very important step in this process. As has been discussed at board meetings going from a partial smoking ban such as we have now, to a full 100% ban is a huge step and your board does not take this responsibility lightly.

Property Maintenance: June 4 is the start date for repairs to 13 decks. We also can expect repairs to damaged asphalt sometime after the deck work is complete. Of course, we will notify all residents as soon as we have a start date. These two projects will pretty much complete our property maintenance plans for summer. Late fall will bring gutter and downspout cleaning. We also hope to do some minor gutter replacements before late fall. Landscape and irrigation work will continue through the summer with several enhancement and drainage projects approved but not vet completed.

Garbage & Recycle: Sorry to keep issuing these reminders but it

Please, no garbage in the recycle bins, especially plastic bags, Styrofoam, containers contaminated by food, plastic lids and bottle caps etc., etc. Also, do not overfill the bins. If the lid won't close please look for another location to dump your trash or recycle or hold off until the Monday pickup.

Reminder: All new owners <u>must</u> fill out an owner/resident application with Mabel at the Clubhouse office. Be sure to take your photo identification that proves you are 55+. Completing this form is a requirement, not voluntary.

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Clubhouse Maintenance

Since our last report we have replaced one of the six furnaces in the Clubhouse - the one which heats and cools the Great Room. The newer ones are more efficient, have more safety features and are covered by warranties some of which stretch out to 20 years. In time for the arrival of warm weather all of the air conditioning compressors were checked out along with the many thermostats in the building.

With help from Rob Mustard we made a video inventory record of all of the property in the Clubhouse. We did not count the silverware, but we have pictures. In times past the inventory was done by making handwritten lists, a laborious process. Rob made it look easy. Copies will be made for safekeeping.

Last year we replaced the glass in fifteen Southside windows. This year we will be replacing maybe two or three depending on the results of an inspection.

This spring, we will be making a proposal to paint the building (same colors) and seal the big cracks in the parking lot. The outdoor lights on the building will also get some attention, probably replacement. The patio furniture has been set out.
