Following Annual Meeting: First Meeting of New Board of Directors

At the Annual Meeting, the owners of King City Highlands will vote to elect four nominees to fill the vacated positions on the Board of Directors – each to be elected to a two-year term.

At the first meeting of the new Board, a **President**, a **Treasurer**, and a **Secretary** will be elected to a one-year term by the Directors.

Nominee biographical sheets have been inserted in this Newsletter to provide information as to each nominee's past experience as well as insight into what each nominee hopes to contribute to the Board.

The Community Association Institute (national organization of homeowner associations) developed the following "Model Code of Ethics for Community Association Board Members to encourage the thoughtful consideration of ethical standards for community leaders."

#### "Board Members should:

- 1. Strive at all times to serve the best interests of the association as a whole regardless of their personal interests.
- 2. Use sound judgment to make the best possible business decisions for the association, taking into consideration all available information, circumstances and resources.
- 3. Act within the boundaries of their authority as defined by law and the governing documents of the association.
- 4. Provide opportunities for residents to comment on decisions facing the association.
- 5. Perform their duties without bias for or against any individual or group of owners or non-owner residents.
- 6. Disclose personal or professional relationships with any company or individual who has or is seeking to have a business relationship with the association.
- 7. Conduct open, fair and well-publicized elections.
- 8. Always speak with one voice, supporting all duly adopted board decisions even if the board member was in the minority regarding actions that may not have obtained unanimous consent.

### **Condo Notes**

Smoking Restriction Update: At the Condo Board of Directors' September meeting, it was decided by Zoe Allen, Don Callender, and Elaine Johanson (Penny Pershey was travelling in Europe at the time) that action on additional smoking restrictions would be tabled until after a new Board is elected at the February 2019 annual meeting. The decision to amend our bylaws in order to implement a 100% smoking ban is huge. It will be costly (legal fees) and time consuming (special meetings and vote gathering). A Board with three current members retiring in February should not go forward on such a momentous change at this time.

Our current smoking resolution, which bans smoking 100% in both the common and limited common areas, continues in full force. This ban includes back patios and decks. If extending the ban beyond the areas covered in the smoking resolution from April 2017 is important to you, I would suggest that you seriously consider running for one of the four open Board positions in 2019.

Garages: Just a reminder that our garages are not storage units. They have no heat, no ventilation, and no light. They are actually intended for vehicles. There is quite a lot of room for storage of various items even when you park a car inside. It's when you pack them full with your "stuff" that you just can't part with, you run the risk of ending up with a mildewed mess. The garages on the west side of the property are quite susceptible to dampness—keep that in mind.

2019 Budget: At the October 11th meeting of the Board of Directors, your Board approved the operating budget for 2019. The increase is just 1.67% which amounts to \$5.00 per month. Once again, building maintenance and landscape/irrigation costs have been beefed up. Our property is growing older and we need to keep it up. We are also changing our contract with CMI so that we will get more help with our property management issues. One change you'll notice is that starting in January our property manager will attend every board meeting. Our contribution to the Replacement Reserve account will remain the same as 2018. Decks and garage door frames will be the major reserve expenses again in 2019.

#### "Board members should not:


- 1. Reveal confidential information provided by contractors or share information with those bidding for association contracts unless specifically authorized by the board.
- 2. Make unauthorized promises to a contractor or bidder.
- 3. Advocate or support any action or activity that violates a law or regulatory requirement.
- 4. Use their positions of decision-making authority for personal gain or to seek advantage over another owner or non-owner resident.
- 5. Spend unauthorized association funds for their own personal use or benefit.
- 6. Accept any gifts directly or indirectly from owners, residents, contractors or suppliers.
- 7. Misrepresent known facts in any issue involving association business.
- 8. Divulge personal information about any association owner, resident or employee that was obtained in the performance of board duties.
- 9. Make personal attacks on colleagues, staff or residents.
- 10. Harass, threaten or attempt through any means to control or instill fear in any board member, owner, resident, employee or contractor."

# Living Well Speaker Series

The Speaker Series resumes on two Sundays in November at the Clubhouse. Family & friends are welcome.

**November 4th at 2 p.m. –** Highlands resident Mike Albright's topic is "Backing Up Your Life." Mike has long been an advocate of preparedness related to important family documents. He practices what he preaches and will discuss the scanning and safely storing of what he did with important Albright family documents. Also, for the past 15 years, Mike has engaged in an extensive family memorabilia preservation project, including almost 2,500 old family photos, along with priceless old correspondence, audio and video recordings, diaries, and obituaries. He has stored these in his safe deposit box and made copies for his siblings and children.

We don't ever want to think about disasters striking our homes, but they happen—fires, tornadoes, earthquakes, and other insidious intrusions into our lives. If your home and its contents were destroyed, what would you lose that you really need; what would you lose that would be a painful, personal, family loss that couldn't ever be replaced? We will talk about important documents that need to be photocopied or scanned and stored in a safe location, such as papers with personal, financial, home-related, and vehicle-related information. Perhaps even more important, we will discuss options for preserving irreplaceable family memorabilia: ancestral family photographs as well as those of our own families, old correspondence, journals and diaries, birth—marriage death certificates, obituaries, military records. and other items of sentimental value. 
We'll set up tables, etc., on Friday, November 30th, at 3 p.m. You may set up your display then, or early Saturday morning, as you wish.

#### Living Well Speaker Series (cont'd from Pg 4) Submitted by Linda Dufresne

November 18th at 2 p.m. - Highlands resident Lucianne Phillips will speak on the Cascadia Subduction Zone—the major earthquake fault that could impact us, as well as covering what you could do to better prepare yourself. Subduction Zone earthquakes are responsible for the major 9point earthquakes. The Pacific Rim is also known as the Ring of Fire because of the earthquakes that may occur. In the USA, Alaska's 9.4 magnitude earthquake in 1964 was the strongest in our nation's history and was caused by a Subduction Zone. That is where one tectonic plate slides under another and catches. Pressure builds until it releases and that is the strong earthquake. The Cascadia Subduction Zone which has the Juan de Fuca plate going under the North American plate spans from northern California to southern Alaska. In this presentation, we will learn more about the geology and the preparedness measures you could take.

Over time, Lucianne has worked on numbers of Red Cross relief operations including earthquakes,

floods, fires and tornados, mostly feeding people or managing service centers. Fluency in French and Spanish opened doors to go into international work. She led preparedness, relief, and recovery operations for the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies in Geneva, Switzerland, and worked in countries in Africa, Latin America, and the Caribbean. Returning to the U.S., she was the Executive Director of several American Red Cross chapters in Washington, California, and Ohio. She then served as the Peace Corps Country Director in Macedonia and Liberia. Lastly, she worked for FEMA in the Pacific Northwest assisting private companies on business continuity and post-disaster economic recovery. She retired last December and moved to the Highlands Community in January this year.

Lucianne has a B.S. Degree in Public Administration and a Master of Public Administration. specializing in disaster preparedness, from the University of Southern California.
