Condo Notes

Fall/Winter Reminders: One of the annual chores here at Highland Park is turning off the water to the outside hose spigot to prevent freezing pipes in case we have a real cold snap. Buildings 1 through 4 have multiple outside faucets and multiple indoor shutoff valves. This is not the case with the other 17 buildings. Most have one hose spigot and one shutoff location--usually, but not always, under a bathroom sink. If you have the ability to open a PDF, we can send you the document that provides information on all the water shutoffs for your unit and building. If you cannot open a three-page document, it is also posted on the bulletin board at the Clubhouse. Mabel can make you a copy. E-mail Zoe Allen if you would like the PDF sent to you (zallen98007@gmail.com). Although we have not had a prolonged cold spell (in the mid to low 20's), it could happen again at any time.

Maintenance Request Reminders: If you are concerned about a maintenance issue in the common or limited common areas, you should contact our Property Manager Erin Ashley at CMI. Her phone number is (503) 445-1119 and e-mail is erina@communitymat.com. The exception to this rule is lightbulb replacements. Please contact our volunteer Sheldon Siegel via e-mail at slsbis@yahoo.com. Be sure to give an exact location of the bulb that is burned out.

In case of an emergency situation that requires calling out a vendor during non-business hours, you should still call CMI and follow the prompts to reach the on-duty emergency manager. That phone number is (503) 233-0300.

Crime: Occasionally we have a rash of petty crime on our property. It usually involves breaking into garages. The correct procedure to follow is to call the King City Police. If you see somebody actively committing a crime, dial 911. If you discover the crime after the fact, please call the non-emergency number for KC Police at (503) 629-0111. The next step is to call your Neighborhood Watch Building Captain. He or she will then pass the information up the chain of command. There is no need to call a Board member since there is nothing they can do. The Neighborhood Watch Coordinator for our property, Sandy Bergeron, will advise the Board Chair if she thinks it's necessary to do so. If you don't know who your Building Captain is, you may call Sandy; there also is a list on the bulletin board at the Clubhouse.

Insurance Reminder: This reminder is for all residents, but especially for our newer owners. Our Rules require that all homeowners purchase and maintain homeowners' insurance. You should specifically have a policy designed just for condos called Homeowners

Condo - Unit Form 6. These policies are designed to work with the Master Insurance coverage provided by American Family Life and paid for by your Condo Association. If your broker or agent does not sell or cannot provide this type of coverage you should find somebody who does. You'll probably save money.

- 1. Per our House Rules, campers, camping trailers, motor homes, etc. may not be parked on the Highland Park property (except inside a garage) for more than 48 hours. This rule applies to all residents.
- 2. No Committee or Board Meetings in December.
- 3. Because our Annual Meeting will fall on Valentine's Day in 2019, the meeting date will be 2/21/19. Much more info to come in January. Just bring your choice of beverage and a dish to be shared. We have snacks, casseroles, salads, and desserts.


Coloring Group



Houses Neighborhood Watch Captains—A Safety-Net

Did you know that there is someone on your block that's always looking out for you? Each street in our Highlands neighborhood of houses has a "Block Captain"—a person who has volunteered to watch for unusual happenings on your street, keep



an eye on your home while you're away (but you have to let them know of course), and be vigilant if there isn't any activity around your home for a couple of days (or more) and check in with you.

If you don't know who your Block Captain is, you can call the Block Captains Chief, Connie Holt, at (503) 936-9297. There's also an area map of the houses with the Block Captains listed on the bulletin board in the Clubhouse. Get acquainted with your neighbors, it's a great place to live.

These forms also need to be updated from time to time as changes occur: i.e., new contacts, new phone numbers, new car, new pets, etc. Please keep Mabel or your Block Captain up to date on any changes.

I want to thank all the Block Captain volunteers who do such a great job meeting and greeting all the neighbors. This is a great example of neighbors helping neighbors and one more reason to live in our Highlands Community.

Our neighborhood garage sneak thieves are at it again. Helpful hints: keep your car locked at all times, even in your garage; don't leave any valuables in your car or garage to tempt a thief. Store

alcohol and Holiday gifts in your condo, not your car or garage. Put a cover over your emergency garage door release or install a new type lock. Some garage doors are in blind alleys and only padlocks can fully protect against a break in. Thankfully, no condo unit has had a break in.

Our Neighborhood Watch Captains are wonderful caring people. Our Watch Captains can help keep you and your property safe. We have written instructions with pictures on how to use your over-ride garage door system if the power fails. Call me if you don't know your building's Captain.

Playing Cinnamon Bear...

Remembering our Anderson Christmas's past, my son Randy was the Cinnamon Bear at Lipman's. He would put on the huge heavy warm bear costume with the Cinnamon Bear head and join in on the fun. Many boys and girls would sit on his lap and tell him what they wanted for Christmas while others would be afraid of him and all he could do was to wave or blow them a kiss. He always made sure each child left with a Cinnamon Bear cookie, even if he had to hand it to Mom.

Because of the weight of the head piece and the warmth of the fur costume, he could only work a few short hours before it was break time. During the three weeks he worked as Cinnamon Bear every year, he would drop about 10 lbs!

Randy was awarded Lipman's Cinnamon Bear of the Year when Frederick and Nelson bought them out. He was such a natural at doing the job because of the fun-filled evenings he had as a child playing with the Cinnamon Bear—a memory that he was able to give to others as he grew up, and could return the favor.

As a child he and his sister listened to the tale of Paddy O'Cinnamon that aired on the radio the day after Thanksgiving and ran through the Christmas season. Eventually, Frederick and Nelson closed its doors and the Lipman name was gone forever, but Cinnamon Bear lives on. Radio station's K103 in Portland and Kool 99.1 in Eugene still air Paddy O'Cinnamon every year.

King City Highlands and Your CPO

Many of you are aware of, and attend, the Community Participation Organization (CPO)4K meetings at the Highlands Clubhouse. But there's more to CPO4K than attending and listening. The Highlands community is of value within CPO4K (which includes King City and the area to Roy Rogers Road) and the intent is to respond to what you think is important to know.

CPO4K is a place for you to bring up issues that are managed by King City, Washington County, Metro, many State agencies, the service providers that make life pleasant (Tigard-Tualatin Aquatic District, TVF&R, Clean Water Services, NW Natural Gas, PGE), as well as Tualatin Wildlife Refuge and area parks.

The CPO program is one of Washington County's community engagement approaches. The program began in 1973 as a way to meet Oregon State Land Use Planning Goal One - Citizen Involvement. It was managed by Oregon State University until 2015 when OSU declined to continue oversight. Following a year-long community task force (appointed by the Washington County Board of Commissioners) including many current and

former CPO volunteers, the conclusion was to bring the program inside the County. Today, the program is part of the Washington County Community Engagement Program under the County Administrator's Office, which reports directly to the Deputy County Administrator.

CPO4K is one of 19 CPOs covering the entire County, but is considered one of the leading CPOs in terms of participation (that's YOU!) and program content. If you haven't attended a meeting, maybe now is the time. Agendas are posted: www.co.washington.or.us/cpo4K. You also can sign up to receive meeting notices directly on the website. Agendas also are posted on the Highlands bulletin board.

Did You Know? — Other Holiday Traditions

St. Nicholas Day

December 6th is the Feast of Saint Nicholas of Myra, which is now a part of Turkey. He was a bishop from the fourth century and noted for his saintly life. He is the model for our modern-day Santa Claus, because Saint Nicholas's generosity was legendary. The night before St. Nicholas Day, children place their shoes in a prominent location—by a fireplace, or outside their bedroom door. The next morning, usually very early, the children find their shoes filled with little presents from the great Saint.



Hanukkah

Hanukkah is a Jewish holiday that starts on the 25th of the Jewish month of Kislev, which coincides with late November-late December on the secular calendar. It is celebrated for eight days and nights. In Hebrew, the word "hanukkah" means "dedication." The Holiday commemorates the re-dedication of the holy Temple in Jerusalem following the Jewish victory over the Syrian-Greeks in 165 B.C.E.

<u>Kwanzaa</u>

Kwanzaa is a seven-day festival which celebrates African American culture and history. It's a time of community gathering and reflection. Kwanzaa begins on December 26th, the day after Christmas, and continues until New Year's Day, January 1st. Each evening a family member, usually the youngest child, lights candles in a special candleholder (kinara) and discusses one of the seven principles of Kwanzaa.

Christmas in Australia

Christmas is on December 25th, but it's the summertime in Australia. People often spend part of Christmas Day with their families at the beach. Christmas dinner is just as likely to be salads, cold meat, prawns and lobsters as the traditional meal of roast turkey and plum pudding. Children believe that Santa leaves presents for them on Christmas eve under the tree. One popular Australian song

states "six white boomers" (large kangaroos) pull Santa's sleigh—getting to Australia, he gives them a rest.
