We have started a dialog with our committee members to help us find ways to better empower them as they continue their volunteer work on behalf of the Community. An initial listening event was held Monday, January 14th.

We have been working hard to clarify what should be communicated via Hi-Net, Highlands *Highlights*, and what should be on our web site. Overall, the goal for our web site is to represent Highlands to the outside community. Potential buyers should be able to visit the site to learn more and to understand why a purchase in our Community is a wise choice. Secondly, we are looking to transition off the CMI web site which is very limited and quite costly. More details will be forthcoming as the Board votes to adopt the recommendations.

We have been engaged in a vigorous debate about the appropriate language to adopt, in order to properly communicate our off-site event policy. Proposed language was shared to the Community and an opportunity to present concerns during Town Hall has been provided.

We have started the process of consolidating our e-mail communications. In doing so, we are transitioning from the use of personal e-mail addresses, which have been used for Association business in the past, to e-mail addresses that are associated with organizational roles. The use of personal e-mail addresses for Association business puts us at too much risk of failing to act on an important matter or notification. People come and go, while the Officer roles and Board roles remain. This move allows us to simply change a password, as new people transition into the various volunteer roles we have on the Board, and in the Community. This solution provides an online portal so any authorized user can access Association e-mail from virtually any location, and the history stays within the organization. This way, a new Board member simply steps into the role, as the current volunteer transitions out. A few new e-mail addresses have been set up and we are evaluating how well this works before we accept this as our final solution.

We have also started the process of consolidating and improving access to the Association's documents by moving them to online storage. We have uploaded over 4,000 files and have created secure online logins for all Board members. We are using tools we already own, which allow us to create, edit, share, collaborate, comment on, and retrieve earlier versions. To see how well this way of managing our documents works, we are testing various scenarios, such as an upload area for CMI to share documents via secure file upload. Initial results look promising.

Mabel will see to it that all proxies she receives are passed on to the Board Chair. We need proxies plus Homeowners in attendance representing 63 of our units to achieve a quorum. Without that, there is no meeting and all that pizza and cost will go to waste.

You are needed: At this writing, we still need candidates for our Board of Directors. We do have two declared candidates—Ed Salzman and Sherry Kilpatrick. Since there are four Board openings, we need a minimum of two additional candidates and more would be better. There is a short two-question candidate questionnaire available at the Clubhouse on the Condo bulletin board. We would appreciate it if each candidate fills out a form and leaves it with Mabel at the Clubhouse Office.

To the many Owners who attended the January Board Meeting and listened to Jason Grosz explain why it's so important to have a fully staffed Board of Directors, first of all, our current Board thanks you for coming and listening. Second, we hope you take what was said very seriously and consider running for the Board and/or volunteering for a Committee.

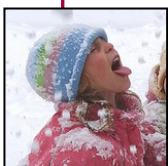

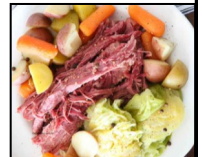

Highlands resident, Mike Albright, will present a talk entitled "A Senior's Guide to the Internet" on Sunday, February 24th, 2-3:30 p.m. in the Clubhouse, with a repeat presentation on Tuesday, February 26th at 4 p.m.



Mike will explain what exactly the Internet is and in simple terms, how it works. Who is in charge of the Internet? (The answer may surprise you.) Who is responsible for ensuring the accuracy and integrity of content placed on the web? (That answer may surprise you, too; or maybe not.) What exactly is an "IP Address", and why is it important? What innovations did companies such as America Online, Netscape, Yahoo!, Google, Amazon, and Facebook bring to cyberspace that we now take for granted and use frequently?

The presentation will cover how the Internet was transformed from little more than a source of static information as late as 15 years ago to a dynamic, highly interactive platform for social media and user-generated content that gives everyone a voice on the Internet. What does this mean for us, both the good and bad? What are the best web browsers, and how do they know where to find the specific web page that you want them to access? How do you establish "bookmarks" or "favorites," and organize them for your convenience? What are the best tools for web searches?

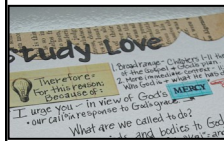

Participants will receive a list of helpful web sites that probably aren't found in your browser's "Suggested Web Sites."

What does "cloud computing" mean, and how can we use it? What is this service referred to as "the Internet of things" (IoT), that allows us to connect to our home systems via our cell phones from anywhere? Mike will conclude with an overview of threats we face on the Internet, from spoofing, phishing, and tracking to the rampant proliferation of misinformation on the web (it isn't just the Russians), and how we can protect ourselves.

Mike obtained his first e-mail address in 1988, just three years after the Internet's birth, and began surfing the World Wide Web in January 1995, when fewer than 25,000 web sites existed world-wide. As Coordinator of Instructional Development at Iowa State University (ISU) from 1995-99, Mike trained 600+ faculty and staff personnel there on what the Internet was and how to use it in their teaching and research. He began training ISU professors to create and use online course activities in 1997, long before learning online became widespread, and continued training college faculty to teach online until his retirement. He's taught 20 online graduate-level courses and is co-author of an award-winning textbook on distance education. Mike received his Ph.D. in Education from Iowa State in 1988, with an emphasis on instructional technology and distance education.

SIGN UP FOR BACKFLOW VALVE TESTING SOON!!

It's once again time to be thinking about Backflow Valve Testing sign-up. (Yes, spring is coming.)

As you are aware, the State of Oregon requires all house owners who have and use underground sprinklers to have their backflow valve tested annually. If the valve malfunctions, it would be a health issue for both you and your neighbors.

For the past several years, the P.M. Backflow Company has provided Highlands Residents with a special rate. They charge our Residents a reduced rate of \$28.00 (normally \$45.00) to perform the testing and submit the necessary paperwork to the Tigard Water Department. This year their testing will be performed in **March and April**.

The following is the process:

1. P.M. Backflow *only* accepts computer "online" sign-ups, (the same as last year) with your payment by credit card.
2. If you are computer savvy, you may do the sign-up at home by yourself. Instruction sheets will be found in the Clubhouse literature rack to the right of the office the first of March. **You may do this any time during the month of March. After March, you will not receive the discounted amount.**
3. If you do not have a computer or need assistance, Mabel in the Highlands Office will be happy to help. She is available during the normal office hours: **Mondays and Wednesdays 9-12 and Thursdays 1-4.**

Note: Please do not attempt to do the sign-up yourself before the first of March. Our code will not be entered in the P.M. Backflow system prior to March 1st, and the discount will not apply. If you have any questions, call Mabel in the Clubhouse Office at (503) 624-8294.

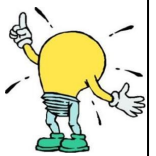


Condos Neighborhood Watch

More 'Did You Know?' About Your Car

Because gasoline is an excellent solvent, too much on your cylinder walls can dissolve the oil that lubricates your cylinders, leading to shorter life on crucial components.

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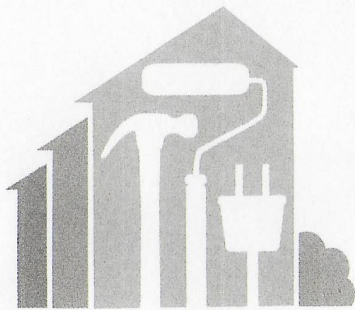
