## **HOA Board Highlights**

I recently learned about an inspiring American woman and athlete, Mia Hamm. Mia is a retired professional soccer player, two-time Olympic Gold Medalist, and two-time World Cup Champion. Mia is hailed as a soccer icon. In her own words:

"I am a member of a team, and I rely on the team, I defer to it and sacrifice for it, because the team, not the individual, is the ultimate champion."

In a similar fashion, each of us is a member of the Highlands Community. Many of us, like Mia, believe we are part of a team. We volunteer, we discuss, we influence, we defer to the Community's consensus, and we help shape our future.

A few Community members don't. They choose conflict over cooperation and insist that things be their way. Yet, no matter how beautiful the grounds and the Clubhouse might be, nobody will want to live in a community filled with conflict and shouting matches.

So, who will you be? Will you be a member of a Community, defer to it and sacrifice for it, because the Community, not the individual, is the ultimate champion?

## Did you know...

When moving into KC Highlands, we all agreed to become members of a Community with shared interests and responsibilities. Together, we protect our investment in one of our largest assets, our homes, by maintaining a high-quality neighborhood. Each of us has partial ownership in the shared property, including the common grounds and Clubhouse. We have shared financial interests. Our roles, rights and responsibilities are defined in the Bylaws; Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs); and the Resolutions.

Some of us may be new residents and have not had the time to read them as shopping for and moving into a home can be a hectic time. Others may have gotten them many years ago when they moved into the neighborhood and may be fuzzy on the details.

These documents can be found on the web site and are full of useful information. Have you reviewed them lately?

# Condo Board Highlights Submitted by Ed Salzman, Chair, Highland Park Board of Directors

The monthly meeting of the Highland Park Condominiums Board was held on Thursday, May 9th.

Smoking Issue Vote Results: The following are the results of the "preliminary vote" on the prohibition of smoking in the Highland Park Condo units. A total of 95 votes were cast, representing 77% of the 124 possible ballots. The tally was:

- Immediate ban (to be effective in 90 days) 35
- Ban with one-year grandfather clause 19
- Ban with full grandfather clause 25
- No ban -- 16

After receiving the results at the May meeting, the Board decided to ask attorney, Stephen Russell, for guidance in the possible placement of a Bylaws measure before the Owners. His response: "There is no legal content to the decision whether to go to the expense and effort of an Owner vote to ban smoking; it's a political decision the Board needs to make on its best judgment about what the Community wants. Thirty-five votes are obviously way short of the 63 votes needed to amend the Bylaws."

This issue will be on the Agenda for the June Board Meeting.

Current Projects: At the May meeting, the Condo Board approved expenditures for a variety of projects. Some of them are:

- ⇒ Roundabout Signs Four arrow signs were authorized for each of our two street roundabouts in an effort to keep vehicles traveling in a counter-clockwise direction.
- ⇒ Doorbell Numbers Purchase and installation of 16 new numbers were approved.
- ⇒ Gable Cleaning Pro Maintenance (Bobby Gang) was given the go-ahead to power wash north-facing gables with the understanding that the work would be done so that water did not get behind any siding. Window washing will follow gable cleaning.
- ⇒ Sidewalks and Curbs -- Pro Maintenance began pressure washing the Condos non -curb areas Monday, May 13th, and sidewalk curb sections were started Thursday, May 16th, with expected completion of all areas by month's end.
- ⇒ Irrigation Repairs The expenditure was approved for repair of sprinkler systems by the landscape contractor.

Attic Vents: Board Member Penny Pershey reported that all 62 attics have been inspected, that no mold problems were discovered and that, with one or two possible exceptions, all vents are now properly attached and cleaned.

Entry Lock Handles: The locksmith who repaired our entry locks submitted a bid for the installation of handle-type locks on all 33 entrances. The Board referred this issue to the Reserve Fund/Maintenance Committee possible inclusion in a future reserve-fund budget. Competitive bids will also be solicited.

From the Finance Report: A Certificate of Deposit (CD) matured at the end of April, and COA Treasurer, Wayne Staley, placed the funds in a 19-month CD earning 2.52%--a much higher rate than the old CD.

## Ants Common To Highland Park Condos...



Sugar Ants: The little dark brown/black ants that we see outside all over the property are commonly referred to as "sugar ants". They are found outside everywhere in the Portland Metro area. They aren't harmful, they rarely bite, and they don't damage buildings. The cost to try to exterminate this little ant from the property would be huge and probably a total waste of money.

These little devils do occasionally invade our homes; however, eliminating them inside your home is the owner's responsibility. Since our buildings don't have crawl spaces and are pretty well constructed, we haven't had lots of problems. In the almost five years I've lived in this area, I've had one small infestation in my kitchen. I was able to totally eliminate them with a product called Terro, available at Home Depot, Fred Meyer, etc. It took a few days but once the ants stopped coming in, they have never returned. I have also used Terro outside near my garage door because there is a nest in the area--Terro has worked there too.

## Helpful Hints...

### ... for New Condo Owners

Lots of new owners have been added to our Community in the last six to eight months, many of whom have never lived in a condominium association environment. Here are a few things you might not know, and are also good reminders for our long-time owners/residents.

- We have a partial smoking ban that's been in place for two years. No smoking is allowed in the common or limited common areas. At the present time the only place you can smoke is inside your unit. This ban applies to owners, visitors, and workers.
- Per our insurance resolution, every unit owner must carry homeowner's insurance. The specific policy for condos is an HO-6 policy. Be sure that is what your agent or broker sells you.
- 3. If you decide to replace your windows and frames you must have permission from your Board of Directors. There is a specific Milgard frame style and color that has Board approval and substitutes will not be accepted. If you are just replacing glass, no permission is required. Window replacement information is available from CMI and is also posted on the Condo bulletin board at the Clubhouse.
- 4. Garbage and recycle pickup is provided by Pride Disposal. Garbage is picked up early every Monday morning, and recycle, every other Monday. In June, recycle will be picked up on June 10<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> and every other Monday thereafter. Please do not overfill the bins, as the lids must close.
- 5. Board of Directors Meetings are the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday each month at 5:30 p.m. in the Clubhouse Boardroom. Owners are welcome and are encouraged to attend. Meetings are a very good way to learn about your new home and meet fellow residents.
- 6. Volunteers are needed for our two permanent committees: Landscape and Replacement Reserve/Maintenance/Finance. The Landscape Committee meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. in the Card Room at the Clubhouse, and Replacement Reserve on the 1<sup>st</sup> Monday at 11:00 a.m. in the Boardroom. Please consider getting involved in this way.

### Condo Maintenance Committee

Is your doorbell broken? If so, it may soon be replaced. The Maintenance Committee is working on a major doorbell upgrade project and wants to give highest priority to those that aren't working. Maintenance Contact, Shel Siegel, requests that Condo residents report broken doorbells to Mabel at the Clubhouse office at (503) 684-8294.

## Condo Landscape Committee



The Committee met with our Brightview Landscape rep, Jean Jung, on May 14th. Next Meeting will be Tuesday June 11th at 10:30 a.m. at the Clubhouse. Any Condo resident with land-

scape concerns is invited to attend. This Committee is always looking for new volunteers. At the May meeting, we discussed upcoming irrigation repairs and a potential landscape project at the north end of our Condo property, above the cement retaining wall. Two of our newer owners stopped by with questions and concerns.

Water usage and conservation is an important concern for our Landscape Committee, the COA Board of Directors, and the HOA Board of Directors. Much more on this subject will be discussed in the coming weeks and months.

**Carpenter Ants:** The other ant that is very common to Western Oregon is

the Carpenter Ant. They are a much larger brown ant and they can do very significant damage if ignored. They develop wings in early summer and flying in may be how they sometimes end up on our property. There really isn't much to attract them to our property and these ants are very rare at Highland Park, but not unheard of. Our building style, landscaping, etc. do not offer a habitat that attracts Carpenter Ants. They prefer dark, damp places such as a crawl space. Somewhat like termites (which don't live in western Oregon), Carpenter Ants like to burrow in and feast on damp, rotting or dead wood.

If you should find Carpenter Ants in your home, please contact our property manager, Erin Ashley, at (503) 445-1119. They will send a professional exterminator to take care of the problem. Don't try to do it yourself!

## Architecture/Landscape Committee

There's an old saying about "April showers..." somehow leading to May flowers.

Well, here in the Portland area this year, April was a little rough! We had an unusually warm and dry spell in April, but then we had some nice rains here in mid-May. Back in April, though, when lots of our street trees were going through bud-break and leafing out, our trees got a little stressed. Too warm, too soon. The Bradford pears, in particular, are showing that stress with lots of curled, gray leaves that have fallen to the sidewalk, and are crunching under foot. The good news is that those pear trees will probably recover from that early heat stress. If you have some 10-10-10 fertilizer handy, sprinkle a light layer under the tree and work it into the soil. There are some other street tree issues underway, specifically regarding the columnar maples in the neighborhood. As of this writing, we're still trying to work up a treatment plan for them; stay tuned for further developments.

The "audit" of the Highlands' irrigation system continues. Kevin McCaleb, the Water Conservation Specialist from the City of Lake Oswego, should have his onsite work done by the end of May, and his full, written report will be delivered to us in early July. I'll make sure a copy of that report is available to all Highlanders. It should make for very interesting reading!

Speaking of the HOA's irrigation system, there are many, many sprinkler heads and nozzles that needed replacement. There was a bit of deferred maintenance from 2018 (during the brief real estate slow-down), and that maintenance was taken care of by Silverleaf in the latter part of May. That should have a good impact on reducing water use for irrigation all by itself.

said, it's important to schedule time for our monthly bible studies. We have two returning speakers from 2018.





## Solicitor Reported...

During the last week of April, Residents from the houses reported a man going around supposedly representing and soliciting for Frontier. He was trying to sign people up for Frontier Internet Service by saying the HOA had changed from Comcast to Frontier. **THIS IS NOT TRUE!** 

The Clubhouse Office reported it to the police, and they went looking for the man. The fellow was found and was told he could not solicit here in KC Highlands without a permit.

If the fellow comes back, or in fact, if ANYONE is trying to solicit within our Community or who looks suspicious at any time, Residents are encouraged to call the Non-Emergency phone number for the police. It is (503) 629-0111.

Here is an auto diagram of what to look for in a vehicle's description, which will help you give the police more detailed and better information. It is also posted on the Clubhouse "Neighborhood Watch" bulletin board. In addition, on that same sheet are the following questions that when answered, will assist the police when making a report:

"The police can use answers to as many of these questions as possible. Please remember that wrong information is worse than no information at all. Answer only those questions that you're sure of.


- 1. How many suspects were there?
- 2. What did they do?
- 3. What did they take?
- 4. Which way did they go?
- 5. Were there any other witnesses? Names and Addresses? Phone numbers?
- 6. Is there any other information you feel is important?"

In addition, it certainly would be wise to alert your Neighborhood Watch Houses Block Captain and Chief Captain, or Condos Building Captain and Condos Coordinator, depending on where you live and

where the incident has taken place. It is important that they know what is going on in our Community neighborhoods, and it may be important for the whole Community to be Informed as well.

Please be very cautious, **never** give a solicitor money, and certainly **do not** let anyone into your house whom you are not expecting or don't know from outside our Community.

After researching snakes of Oregon and looking at (ugh!!) multiple pictures. It was decided the snake in the Condo garage was a juvenile Gopher Snake.



## Tips for Storing Your Food...

*In the Fridge:* Most fruits, veggies, herbs and all cut produce can be stored in the fridge.



Store separately: Store fruits and veggies separately. Gases from ripening fruit, especially apples, pears, and bananas, can make other produce ripen and spoil faster.

On the Counter: Basil, tomatoes, and avocados can live on the counter. Stone-fruit (peaches, apricots, plums) and citrus can be out until they ripen and then go in the fridge.

In a cupboard/pantry: Store onions, garlic, win-

ter squash, potatoes, mangos, papayas and pineapples in a cool dark place, like a cupboard.

**Special Note**: Store potatoes separately from onions. Gases from the onions will make potatoes sprout faster.

Law enforcement strongly encourages residents and businesses to shred paperwork containing personal and sensitive information in order to reduce the risk of identity theft. Information released from the Oregon Attorney General noted Oregon ranked 15th in the nation regarding the growth of reported incidents of identity theft.

To combat the threat of identity theft, the Tigard Police Department has teamed up with Pride Recycling to offer a free document shredding event for the local community. This allows residents to securely dispose of paper documents containing personal information.

The event is on **Saturday June 1st**, **9:00 a.m. - Noon**. Location: Tigard City Hall Parking Lot, 13125 SW Hall Blvd. Each household is limited to two hand-carry boxes, bags, or containers (no exceptions!). Do not bring any garbage or other items for disposal or recycling.

## Measuring Our Garbage...

### The results are in...and they may surprise you!

Every five years, the State of Oregon asks researchers to take samples of our garbage and measure what they find. It turns out that we waste a LOT of food! Almost 20% of our garbage is food that should have been eaten!

Individual households are responsible for throwing out almost 33,000 TONS of edible food per year in Washington County. At the same time nearly 11% of Washington County residents don't have reliable access to nutritious food.

We're not alone in this. About 40% of food in the U.S. is wasted. When we waste food, we waste everything that went into growing and producing that food, e.g., water, land, energy, and labor.

The good news IS: when everyone makes small changes at home, it can add up to making a real difference!

## Origins of Father's Day...

The campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers did not meet with the same enthusiasm as Mother's Day—perhaps because, as someone said, "fathers haven't the same sentimental appeal that mothers have."

On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah--but it was a one-time commemoration.

The next year, a Spokane, Washington woman named Sonora Smart Dodd—one of six children raised by a widower—tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She finally was successful in drumming up support for her idea: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day.

Today, the day honoring fathers is celebrated in the United States on the third Sunday of June. In other countries-especially in Europe and Latin America-fathers are honored on St. Joseph's Day, a traditional Catholic holiday that falls on March 19th. --www.history.com

## The Longest Day—Shortest Night



June solstice is your signal to celebrate summer in the Northern Hemisphere and winter in the Southern Hemisphere.

In the Northern Hemisphere, this solstice marks the longest day of the year. Early dawns. Long days. Late sunsets. Short nights. The sun at its

height each day, as it crosses the sky. South of the equator, winter begins.


What is a solstice? Ancient cultures knew that the sun's path across the sky, the length of daylight, and the location of the sunrise and sunset all shifted in a regular way throughout the year. They built monuments, such as Stonehenge, to follow the sun's yearly progress.

Today, we know that the solstice is an astronomical event, caused by Earth's tilt on its axis and its motion in orbit around the sun. It's because Earth doesn't orbit upright; rather, it is tilted on its axis by 23-1/2 degrees. Earth's Northern and Southern Hemispheres trade places in receiving the sun's light and warmth most directly. At the June solstice, Earth is positioned in its orbit so that our world's North Pole is leaning most toward the sun.

All locations north of the equator have days longer than 12 hours at the June solstice. Meanwhile, all locations south of the equator have days shorter than 12 hours.



March Portland Residential Highlights: According to the Regional Multiple Listing Service March brought some gains to the Portland metro area, but all measures were cooler than last year in March 2018. There were 3,504 new listings, a 43.4% increase over February 2019 (2,444) but new listings fell 3.9% short of the 3,648 new listings offered last year in March 2018. Pending sales (2,738) ended 5.4% below the 2,894 offers accepted last year in March 2018 but rose 24.0% over the 2,208 offers accepted last month in February 2019. Closed sales, at 2,183 in March, fared similarly, ending 7.9% below the 2,371 closings recorded in March 2018 but rising 26.5% from last month in February 2019 when 1,726 closings were recorded. Inventory decreased to 2.2 months in March, with total market time decreasing to 68 days. There were 4,808 active residential listings on the market in the Portland metro area this March. Average and Median Sale Prices Comparing the average price of homes sold in the twelve months ending March 31st of this year (\$452,700) with the average price of homes in the twelve months ending March 2018 (\$434,800) shows an increase of 4.1%.
