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Board Member Succession

The HOA has started a Board Member succession discussion in order to find a more balanced rotation amongst Board Members. Currently, we have five Directors who serve two -year terms. One of those terms ends this November and four end the following year. We believe it's in the best interest of the Community to find a more balanced rotation to avoid the potential for an 80 percent turnover during a single year.

HOA Board Highlights

Several approaches have been discussed, including ones that would require changes to our governing Approaches that indocuments. volve changing governing documents require consultation with legal counsel and other expenses necessary to ratify the changes within the Community. We are advocating for a more practical and less costly approach. Dave Platt has indicated a preference to resign in November this year. We are proposing that we elect two Directors in November, with the understanding that once the two individuals have been seated, Mr. Platt would resign. This will leave us with a five-member Board, and a three- or two-Board Member rotation in future alternating years.

The governing documents do not specifically promote this approach; however, we believe it is a wellestablished precedent. Additionally, by moving ahead openly and honestly, with a clear explanation and a vote by the Community, we can achieve the goal at minimum cost. Please attend upcoming Town Hall events to voice your opinion, so the Board can take Community feedback into account as we move ahead.

The HOA has benefited from the excellent work conducted by the 2018 Election Committee and is seeking volunteers to lead the 2019 Election Committee. Please reach out to any Board member to lend a hand. Finally, think about running for the Board.

Insurance

Did you know the HOA carries extensive insurance coverage, with affordable deductibles? We also carry earthquake coverage. However, unlike other types of coverage, earthquake has high out-of-pocket costs. The HOA has set a reserve fund floor, which we believe is adequate to cover all reasonably anticipated insurance deductibles without having to resort to a special assessment.

Solicitors

The HOA will never approve houseto-house solicitation. Any service providers who may, from time to time, be approved to present to the Community will be invited to a communitywide meeting at the Clubhouse. Do not trust any door-to-door solicitors who say otherwise.

Irrigation Cost Reduction

The cost of irrigating the common property was raised as a top concern during our April Community input event. Coincidentally, a team lead by Rob Mustard has been investigating the issue and our options. During the regular June meeting, the HOA Board will begin getting briefed, and will provide input to the team to help steer this project. Additionally, discussions between our two Associations (HOA and Condos) have been initiated. Please come to an upcoming Town Hall to learn more and share your views.



Condo News

Condo Board Highlights Submitted by Ed Salzman, Chair, Highland Park Board of Directors

The monthly meeting of the Condominium Owners Association (COA) Board was held June 13th at the Clubhouse.

Important—Proposing A New Bylaw



Condo Owners will soon receive ballots in the mail on a proposed new bylaw prohibiting smoking in the Condo units. The proposal contain so-called "grandfather will a clause" permitting current Residents to continue smoking in their units.

A majority affirmative vote of the Owners would be required for the measure to go into effect. If the bylaw is approved, all new Residents would be prohibited from smoking in the units. Smoking is already banned in the common areas of the Community.



At the Board Meeting, Directors requested that the attorney for the COA draft the bylaw, which would then be submitted to the Board for approval. The next step would be the preparation

of the ballot by CMI, the Association's management firm. The ballot and accompanying explanatory material would also be submitted to the Board for approval before being mailed to Owners.

Once the ballots are distributed, Owners will have 90 days to vote and return the ballots to CMI by mail or to the Clubhouse Office. If the measure is approved, all prospective home buyers will be notified that smoking is prohibited inside the units.

The attorney was also asked to determine whether a bylaw would be required to mandate that all smokers obtain, operate, and maintain air filter machines in their units. If a bylaw is not necessary, the Board could require the installation of air filters, whether or not the prohibition measure is approved. These filters have been proposed as a method of reducing second-hand smoke in units adjacent to smokers.

The Board chose the full grandfather clause option over an immediate ban or a one-year exemption because Directors felt that the proposal had the best chance of receiving a majority vote of the Highland Park Condominium Owners.



Projects —Finished, Continuing, and New

- \Rightarrow A major new project may be under way. It has been discovered that many of the water shut-off valves in the ground outside the Condo buildings are inoperable or inaccessible. Some are rusted away. Some are under a foot of water, and others sit under a blanket of mud. To determine the extent of the problem, the Board authorized hiring a plumber to conduct a survey and tell the COA how many valves need to be repaired and at what cost.
- \Rightarrow The garage door-frame repairs are finally finished. The contractor made good on promises to correct errors that were made during the initial frame construction.
- \Rightarrow Installations have been made to the following: directional arrows on all four sides on each roundabout; and Unit numbers next to some of the doorbells.
- \Rightarrow The Committee studying possible use of recycled water for irrigation is not ready to make a proposal because not enough financial information is yet available. Our Board has invited Rob Mustard, Committee Chair, to give a status report to the Board at our July meeting.

New Doorbells Coming

At its June meeting, the Board decided to install new doorbell ringers at the entrance to all units. A total of 150 ringers will be purchased, allowing for some in reserve for those that break over time.



doorbell replacement project was The triggered by a desire for uniformity throughout the Community. Currently, a few doorbells are broken and quite a few different styles have been installed over time. The next step will be to hire someone to install ringers for all 124 Condo

units. The Board also must decide whether to purchase name holders to be installed adjacent to the new doorbells.

Explaining Condo Common Areas — Part I



The first thing to remember about condominium common areas is that all Owners and Residents have equal access to them. Secondly, it is the Board of Director's responsibility to budget for, and maintain, all these common areas.

At Highland Park, the **common areas** consist of our private street—130th Terrace, the parking lots, and all sidewalks and curbs. Next—and this is very important for all Residents to understand—all grounds are common areas. No Resident has "their own yard." Your Association pays a professional landscape company and arborists to maintain all the shrubs, plants, trees and lawns. You may not decide to plant anything in a common area without written permission



from the Landscape Committee and your Board of Directors; nor should you take it upon yourself to start pruning trees or shrubs.



You may not tell a neighbor that they can't walk their dog near your building. Equal access, remember? Of course, if the dog is a nuisance, i.e., being allowed off leash, incessant barking, human not cleaning up after their dog, etc., you should speak politely to the irresponsible human. If that doesn't work, you can talk to your Neighborhood Watch Building Captain, or as a last resort you can send a written complaint to our property manager at CMI who will pass

your concerns on to the Board of Directors. Dogs are the only pets specifically addressed in the Highland Park House Rules. Cats are not mentioned, but the Board strongly recommends that cat Owners not allow their pets to run loose outside. It is very dangerous for the cats themselves and annoying to some Owners.

One last thing: human Residents can walk around buildings, on the grass, etc. It is not appropriate to tell your neighbors to "get out of your yard"—it is not your yard.

There are more parts of the property that are defined in the CC&R's as limited common areas. Look for these to be addressed in the August Highlights.

Architecture/Landscape Committee

Weather-wise, the warm months of 2019 have gotten off to a fairly mild start. We had

a little bit of rain in early May, a couple of warm spells, but overall, mostly comfortable temperatures. The rain we've received isn't up to the typical average, but it's wetter than 2018!

So, what does that mean? Well, it should mean that we'd need to use less water to irrigate the plants around the common areas. In reality, it's still pretty early in the year, and this year's HOA water bills appear to show the exact same amount of water consumed as last year, so there's no real change in watering expenses. The "watering season" only starts at the beginning of May, however, so it's a little soon to see any real effects.

Still, the newer plantings that have been done around the neighborhood-and even in our own yardsmay not have had time to get established. The new street trees, for example, can take up to two years of steady watering to stretch out their roots to allow for resilience in times of stress. Already this year, we've had enough nice, sunny days to encourage lots of photosynthesis. As the plants are soaking up sun and producing beautiful flowers and leaves, that means they're drawing moisture from the soil. Folks, if you have one of

Ordinarily, unless the trees are storm-damaged, diseased, or causing damage to infrastructure, the HOA would not remove them. However, a Homeowner can elect to have a large, mature street tree removed and replaced - at the Homeowner's expense. That would require an ALC application, but the Committee will be happy to work with Homeowners to facilitate that kind of project. Contact the ALC and let us know.

It was brought to the HOA Board's attention that numerous parties have been posing as solicitors, claiming they have HOA approval to speak directly with Homeowners to solicit new business in KC Highlands.

This will never be the case. Be advised the Board will never approve house-to-house solicitation. The Board will only approve service providers presenting to the Community in the Clubhouse. These presentations will be rare, will be scheduled, and advance notice will be provided.

Anyone claiming they have approval of the HOA will be misrepresenting the situation. In general, we should all be wary when unexpected people knock on our doors. We should be even more wary when someone starts out misrepresenting themselves. Let good safety practices and common sense be your guide: don't give information or money to these folks, and by all means, never let any unexpected visitor into your home.

Things of Summer...

Summer is wild berry season all across the United States. In Oregon, we are blessed with many varieties. Strawberries are available from early May through June and then again in August through September. Raspberries ripen mid-June through July with others coming in mid-August through September. Red, Black and Evergreen raspberries are common favorites. From July into September you'll find a wide variety of local blueberries. The boysenberry — thought to be the result of a blackberry crossed with a Loganberry or red raspberry reigns mid-July through mid-August. Marionberry season also starts in mid-July and goes into August. This Chehalem blackberry and Olallieberry cross is named for Marion County where it was first cultivated in the 1950s and is known as the cabernet of



We can find fresh berries at many of the 100-plus *farmers' markets* statewide. Do-it-yourselfers will

enjoy **U-pick farms** on the Hood River County Fruit Loop, The Vineyard and Valley Scenic Tour Route, Canby Farm Loop, and farms throughout the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon.

Look for the **Oregon Berry Festival** in July. Admission is free, and you'll find Oregon berries transformed into ice creams, pies, cobblers, jams, shortcakes, sauces, liqueurs, chocolates, sodas and much more. Or find Oregon berry recipes and cook up your own delicious dessert.

Did you know honey is a mixture of bee spit and flower nectar or pollen? Honey never

April Portland Residential Highlights: According to the **Regional Multiple Listing Service** the Portland metro area saw mostly gains this April, with new listings leading the way. There were 4,210 new listings, a 5.5% increase over April 2018 (3,990) and a 20.1% increase over the 3,504 offered last month in March 2019. This was the strongest April for new listings in the area since 2010, when 4,713 were offered. Pending sales, at 3,102 in April, increased 3.1% over April 2018 (3,008) and 13.3% over March 2019 (2,738). There were 2,409 closings in the region in April, a 10.4% increase over March 2019 (2,183) but a decrease of 4.5% from the 2,523 closings recorded last year in April 2018. Total market time decreased in April to 53 days, with inventory holding steady at 2.2 months. There were 5,400 active residential listings in the Portland metro area in April. Average and Median Sale Prices: Comparing 2019 to 2018 through April, the average sale price has increased 0.3% from \$444,600 to \$445,900.
