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# HOA Board Highlights

It has been an interesting period in my life where the confluence of three circumstances have helped me to see KC Highlands with a renewed perspective. First, some concerns regarding compliance with our covenants, conditions and restrictions have been brought to my attention. As a result, I have had the opportunity to drive and to walk our neighborhood numerous times. Second, Don and I just completed the remodel of a condo on Crown Drive in King City, where my mother now resides. Third, Don and I have recently visited friends' neighborhoods, our prior neighborhood, as well as a number of neighborhoods in the vicinity of KC Highlands. During the home search with my mother, we surveyed properties in KC Highlands, Summerfield, and King City. Each of these communities offers unique living experiences and have differing amenities.

There are few neighborhoods as visually appealing as our KC Highlands Community. The common areas look terrific and the 'curb appeal' of homes is excellent. In contrast to many other neighborhoods I have visited this summer, KC Highlands stands out as extraordinary.

The surrounding community has noticed as well. Homes and Condos in KC Highlands have been selling very quickly and at favorable prices. We have welcomed many new Homeowners this year, culminating in the Ice Cream Social where annually we meet and greet our new neighbors. While we encourage neighbors to speak with and to work with one another, we are finding that neighbors are hesitant to speak up, as they don't want to be offensive.

It may be time for self-reflection and for reaching out to our neighbors. Could it be my dog that does not bark while I am home, might be barking incessantly until I return? How would I knowperhaps I should ask my neighbors. Maybe I should venture out into my yard and look at my bushes and trees from perspective—would my neighbor's I want to have that view? Perhaps the landscape could use a bit of attention or trimming. Maybe I should move my car from in front of my neighbor's living room window. Yes, I suppose I did have the motor home on the street a few days longer than I should. Perhaps I ought to check in with my neighbors to see if any of those or other things might be bothering them. I will commit to do better, to ask, and to initiate the discussion.

As your President, I have volunteered to lead the organization. I don't want to become the neighborhood compliance officer, and I am quite sure you don't want me to show up at your front doors. Let's all prevent further escalation of compliance issues. Take some time to see if you are the neighbor that you would like others to be.

# **Condo News**

#### Condo Board Highlights Submitted by Ed Salzman, Chair, Highland Park Board of Directors

The monthly meeting of the Condo Owners Association (COA) Board was held August 8th.

#### Still Time to Vote...

The "polls" are still open on the proposed smoking measure even though enough affirmative votes have been submitted to place the smoking ban into the COA Bylaws.

CMI's Erin Ashley reported at the August 8th Board Meeting that 84 votes had been cast-66 were in favor and 18 against, with 63 "yes" votes required for approval. Nevertheless, the Board would like more Owners to cast votes so that a larger percentage of the Association's membership is represented in the final tally.

The measure will become effective after the required legal paperwork is done. No current Resident will be affected by the measure because it contains a grandfather clause exempting all current Owners from the ban on smoking inside the units.

After the Bylaw amendment becomes effective, all new Owners will be covered by the prohibition. CMI routinely provides copies of the Bylaws to all prospective buyers of units, who will be notified that Highland Park is a nonsmoking community.

Anyone wishing to vote and who has misplaced their ballot can get a replacement from Erin at CMI (503-445-1119).

#### Condo Projects Galore...

- Doorbells and Name Plates -- Before the summer is over, the new doorbell ringers and name plates should be installed. The Board delayed having the bell work done until name plates were available. After that work is completed, it will be necessary to print out laminated names and insert them into the plates.
- Deck Repairs/Rehab -- This year's deck rehabilitation work was almost completed at the time of the August Board Meeting, but there were a few problems that still needed correction. It will take two more years to complete the deck project, with 17 units still to be completed.
- Water Shut-Off Valves -- Repairing broken water shut-off valves is still a work in progress, partly because it has not yet been determined how many valves are broken. Nevertheless, the Board authorized repair of the valve outside Building 7-and that's a tricky project because the valve box is full of mud and water.
- Irrigation System -- Irrigation system leaks were discovered near Buildings 7 and 10, and Brightview was given the go-ahead to find the source of the leaks and repair them.
- Hacker Protection -- The COA's accountants recently recommended that the Association obtain "fidelity and computer fraud insurance." Upon inspection, it turns out that the COA already has \$650,000 coverage for employee dishonesty, forgery, and computer fraud.

#### Garage Door Locks

Submitted by Sandy Bergeron There are several new Condo Unit Owners who do not have a key for their garage door emergency lock. They would have trouble getting into the garage to get their car out or get needed supplies if there was a power outage or emergency/disaster that affected electricity,



The type of lock shown here has a different type of key and is harder to breach with a screwdriver than some of the others have been. I would suggest the door lock on the garage siding be changed to the same type of lock at

the same time the emergency lock is changed.

I had a couple of handymen change my aaraae door emeraency lock when I first moved in. If we have enough Unit Owners interested, perhaps we can get a group deal from a locksmith to do them all. Another option is to have a reputable garage door company, such as Dave's Garage Doors, do the work.

As of this writing there are 14 people interested. Inquiries will be made soon to see who will give us the best service and price, but you still have time to think about it and you'll be kept informed about the progress in this process.

#### Condo Landscape Committee

The Committee met on Tuesday, August 13th with Jean Jung, our Brightview rep, present.

Zoe Allen explained what funds were still available in the 2019 budget for miscellaneous landscape projects, irrigation, and tree care.

Arrangement was made with Halsteads Arborists to do a walk-around to inspect our larger trees, looking at what will need to be done this fall in the way of high pruning, tree removals, and treating for disease.

Jean reported that almost all the summer shrub and plant shearing is done. Both round-a-bouts are looking good-there is good growth and will be left as is for now. The irrigation inspection was completed, but the written report isn't complete yet. Approval to repair two major leaks was given at the August Board meeting.

The spray techs continue to spray for weeds. Two committee members requested we explore options other than the generic Round-Up product being used. Jean reported that we could explore going with organics, but they are not as effective, and more costly. She will research this.

The Committee went through Brightview's Proposals dated August 6th, item by item. The committee will recommend that the Board approve small planting projects at five locations, leaving enough dollars in this year's budget for possibly one more project before year-end.

# **HOA Committee Reports**

## Architecture/Landscape Committee Submitted by Rob Mustard



After all the noise and sawdust flying around in the past month, things have suddenly gone a little quiet! Oh, except for the noise and dust from the construction zone on 131<sup>st</sup> Avenue, of course...

Regarding the Sickly Maples: All of them have been removed, and things should be ready for planting the new street trees this fall. To that end, Mark Perkins has worked up a new list of street tree options. The old list included the very popular Venus dogwood, plus a couple of other species. The problem was that those other two species just weren't readily available from the local nurseries. So, we'll now have a half-dozen options to choose from, including a hawthorn, two different ash species, a tree lilac, Ginkgo, and that ever-popular Venus dogwood. These options offer a variety of flower colors (or not), trunk and foliage colors and textures, fruit (or not), and definitely will bring some new variety to our streetscapes. The Homeowners who lost their trees recently will be able to make their selections, and planting should occur in a few months.

**Patchy Lawn Areas:** You may have noticed some out in front of the Clubhouse, or even in the lawns of some Homeowners. Summer is peak season for the growth phases of a variety of insect species, including various beetles and crane flies. Beetle grubs must give off quite an irresistible aroma—to the neighborhood skunks and raccoons, that is—leading to dug-up patches of turf. Crane fly larvae also can wipe out a lawn pretty quickly all by themselves, as has happened in front of the Clubhouse. Fortunately, there are easy treatments to get rid of those insect larvae. Head for your favorite

Some Residents have expressed that they're experiencing difficulty lowering the blinds in the Game Room. When speaking with the blinds company rep, he gave me a couple of tips I wish to pass along:

- **Raise** the blinds by pulling the cord down and a few feet to the **right** of the window molding to the desired height and it will lock in place.
- To **lower** the blinds, pull the cord a few feet to the **left**, toward the center of the blind. It will release and drop.

Hope this helps—he raised and lowered the blinds without any issues, stating they are in good condition.

You also may notice the sign on Pacific Highway--Beef Bend will close from September 4<sup>th</sup> through mid-October. This is the Washington County project to replace the culvert on Beef Bend Rd. near147<sup>th</sup>. This will be a complete closure, as there will no getting around the ginormous hole they will be digging!

#### What are CPO4K Meetings?

No, that's not a national holiday (but it could be). It's the start of your Community Participation Organization meeting season—the place where you can talk about issues in the city, county (or beyond), learn about planning and development coming to the area, ask questions of the agencies that provide you water, sewer, streets, and other great stuff, or just come to be social—your neighbors attend...

The first meeting welcomes your Washington County Board of Commissioners Chair, Kathryn Harrington. Learn what efforts the County is undertaking and bring your questions about local and regional growth and transportation (among other topics).

Your CPO4K (for King City area out to Roy Rogers Road) usually meets the fourth Monday, but this month's meeting will be Thursday, September 26th at 7 p.m.—location is TBD. Then it's back to fourth Mondays at the Highlands Clubhouse. See September meeting details on page 6 of this issue.

Upcoming topics include the history of our area from local and regional historians; Metro's proposed Transportation Bond; the Southwest Corridor MAX line progress; changes to Haag Lake dam; updates on the River Terrace construction; and conversations with Kina City leaders and planners about the work on 131st Avenue, changes to zoning at Fischer/131st, and Master Planning for the city's expansion westward—to note a few projects.

This is your community, and your CPO is the place to hold these discussions, get answers, and provide your voice to decision-making. Hope to see you there!

### Photo Enforcement Update

After several delays, photo traffic enforcement will come to Tigard this fall at three intersections along Pacific Highway (99W)-SW 72<sup>nd</sup> Ave, SW Hall Blvd, and



Durham Rd.—making them safer for drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists.

The technology produces high resolution videos and images capturing vehicles entering an intersection during a red light. Photo enforcement is not designed to get you in trouble; it's intended to improve driver behavior, promote compliance, and make our roadways safer.

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT manages Pacific Hwy) is reviewing the plans. After a permit is granted, Conduent, the City's contractor for photo enforcement, installs the equipment. When the system is up and running, a 30-day warning period will follow. Owners of registered vehicles photographed running red lights at these intersections will receive warning letters that future violations will result in traffic citations.

When the system flags a violation, a police officer reviews the video and photos to verify that a violation did occur. The mailed citation includes a link to photos and video footage, so the driver can also review the incident. Before the "go-live" date, a hotline will be established to answer general questions about traffic citations related to photo enforcement and will connect individuals with the correct city representative to follow up.

#### Labor Day Misconceptions...

The common one is that since Labor Day is a National Holiday, everyone gets the day off. NOT !



The first Labor Day was created by striking, but the idea of a special holiday for workers was easy for politicians to support. This was because proclaiming a Holiday costs legislators nothing and benefits them by finding favor with voters. In 1887, Oregon, Colorado, Massachusetts, New York, and New Jersey declared the special September legal Holiday to celebrate workers.

Within 12 years, half the states in the country recognized Labor Day as a Holiday. It became a National Holiday June 1894 when President Grover Cleveland signed the Labor Day Bill into law. Congress' proclamation covers only federal employees. Each state declares its own legal holidays.

Proclaiming an official Holiday means little, as it does not require private employers and some government agencies to give their workers the day off. Many stores are open, essential government services in protection and transportation continue to function, and even less essential programs like National Parks are open. Because not everyone is given time off on Labor Day, union workers as recently as the 1930s were being urged to stage one-day strikes if their employer refused to give them the day off.

#### REMEMBERING 9/11



This was originally published in September 2016, and updated in September 2018:

"...years later, the attacks of September 11, 2001 are still fresh in the memories of many Americans.

Nearly 3,000 people in New York, Virginia, and Pennsylvania lost their lives on 9/11 after terrorists orchestrated by Osama bin Laden hijacked airplanes as weapons. As the years pass, suffering continues alongside the memorializing—among those who lost loved ones and by survivors who sustained injuries or who were forever changed by the horrific events—even as the country and the world change.

Now, the site of the New York City attacks is home to One World Trade Center, the tallest building in the Western Hemisphere and a marker of resilience in the face of tragedy. There are also memorials near the Pentagon and in Stoystown, PA.

To honor the anniversary, the National September 11 Memorial & Museum in New York City—which opened in 2014—hosts its annual 9/11 Commemoration Ceremony, followed by the "Tribute in Light," in the evening, with twin beams of light representing the World Trade Center buildings illuminating the New York City skyline from 3 p.m. to midnight EDT.

The events complement the permanent parts of the museum that document the tragedy of that day. Clifford Chanin, vice president of education and public programs at the museum, said in a previous interview that "many of the images from 9/11 still convey the rawness and brutality of the attack ... they still have the capacity to shock."

A raid on a core group took place on Friday, October 13, 1307. This began the end of the Knights Templar, which was disbanded by Pope Clement V in 1312.

Although there are a variety of possible stories of origin, there isn't any scientific evidence backing claims that the day is inherently unlucky. Time noted that it's possible a self-fulfilling prophecy is to blame for bouts of bad luck that occur on Friday the 13th.

June Portland Residential Highlights: According to the Regional Multiple Listing Service pending sales saw the sole gain this June in the Portland metro area. At 3,083, pending sales rose 0.8% compared with June 2018 (3,059) despite decreasing 6.3% from last month in May 2019 (3,292). New listings, at 4,281, fell 5.2% short of the 4,515 new listings offered last year in June 2018 and 12.7% from last month in May 2019 (4,902). Closed sales performed similarly, ending 6.4% under the 2,946 closings recorded in June 2018 and 7.2% below the 2,969 closings from May 2019. Inventory rose slightly to 2.4 months in June. Total market time decreased to 42 days in the same period. There were 6,735 active residential listings in the Portland metro area this June. Year to Date Summary: Activity is mixed so far in 2019 compared with 2018. New listings (22,599) are up 2.4%, while pending sales (15,956) are down 2.1% and closed sales (13,842) are down 4.8%. Average and Median Sale Prices: Comparing 2019 to 2018 through June, the average sale price has increased 0.7% from \$453,400 to \$456,700. In the same comparison, the median sale price has increased 1.8% from \$400,000 to \$407,000.
