HOA Board Highlights

Friends and neighbors, as I write this, we come up on a year serving as your HOA President. In that year together, we have accomplished a number of projects and changes that leave our Community stronger. Four achievements are standouts. First, we have set up Office 365 and a framework where the business of the Community is no longer conducted on personal e-mail accounts. We now have roles for President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the two Director positions. We have set up document storage online, getting HOA documents off personal machines and onto reliable storage. We have groups configured for A&L, Finance, and Board members—where individuals can organize and collaborate on documents and budgets. This is an important achievement, as it provides for continuity by allowing new volunteers to simply assume their role by changing a password. Second, we fully funded the kitchen project to bring It to completion. A small additional investment of \$6,000 allowed the Community to remove the risk associated with splitting the project over two budget cycles while leveraging personal relationships to secure significant discounts that are no longer available to the Community. The kitchen project cost less than \$20,000 and was installed with volunteer labor. That is an outstanding accomplishment at an astonishingly low cost. Third, we have stopped e-mailing our financial statements to help protect the HOA from being a victim of fraud. Fourth, we have set aside \$200,000 in our Reserve Account to cover the high deductible and other costs that the Community would have in the event of significant earthquake damage. This helps protect each of us from economic uncertainty.

This will be my final post as your President. Don and I plan to sell our home in KC Highlands, most likely by Spring. Accordingly, I believe it would be disingenuous to continue in my role, while knowing that I really don't have any skin in the game. Accordingly, by the time you read this I will have informed the Community that I will not continue to serve on the Board. Thank you to all of you who offered a supportive note or a nudge in the right direction. Finally, I am certain that the Community is strong, resilient, and desirable sometimes a bit contentious. I encourage everyone to take a breath, work constructively with the new Board, and assume positive intent.


Condo Board Highlights Submitted by Ed Salzman, Chair, Highland Park Board of Directors

The monthly meeting of the Condo Owners Association (COA) Board was held Thursday, October 10th.

Year 2020 Budget—The COA Budget for 2020 was presented to the Board of Directors at its meeting, and here's the good news: There will be no increase in the monthly dues in 2020. The budget was developed by Treasurer Wayne Staley and Finance Committee Chair Zoe Allen, and approved by the Board at the October Board Meeting.

Major maintenance projects in 2020 include repairs to nine more decks, replacement of the door trim on the 35 remaining garages, drainage projects etc. Funds are included for new handles and locks for the buildings' front doors, but next year's Board of Directors will determine whether that project will proceed.


Veterans Administration Mortgages: The Board its October meeting Association to obtain certification for Veterans Administration (VA) mortgages. This is done through a process designed to show the VA that our Association is fiscally sound. The cost to the COA is \$599. Once approval is granted, Veterans will be able to obtain VA mortgages without providing the 20 percent down payment typically required for conventional loans. The main benefit to Condo Owners is that there will be a larger pool of potential buyers when they put their units on the market.

- No-smoking by-law. By the time this newsletter is distributed, the No-Smoking By-law should become operative. There was a delay caused by a glitch in submitting the legal documents to the County.
- New nameplates have arrived. Pro Maintenance was given the go-ahead to install new doorbells and nameplates.
- Weed Control. A bid from Pro Maintenance (Bobby Gang) to do the necessary weeding by hand in 2020 was accepted. Brightview submitted a new lower three-year contract offer without weeding, and it was accepted by the Board.

Did you Submitted by Quila Bowles know that Dolly Bailey, who lives in one of our Highland Park Condos, was featured in The Regal Courier's October issue? She made front page news! What follows are a few excerpts from that article.


She's a remarkable woman, age 92, who still works at our neighborhood Rite Aid store at Tigard Town Square. After an 18-year career with J.C. Penney, rather than thinking of retirement, she began a second career as a cashier at Rite Aid. They recently had a 30-year anniversary celebration for her. Her store manager says, "Dolly is a part of King City—everybody knows who she is." Some customers even stay in line just to have her wait on them.

Dolly says that after her husband died, she needed to be with people, so she went to work and hasn't ever regretted it. It's been full time since Day 1. She enjoys doing a lot of different things as part of her job, and even brings in home-made baked goods on "freight day," when store supplies are delivered. She says, "They need the energy to get the jobs done!"

She credits her longevity to a breakfast of rice and nine gin-soaked raisins, walking, being with people, and doing daily crossword puzzles. In the time off that she has coming, she wants to visit Hawaii and Alaska (she's been to Alaska seven times!) After this many years, she doesn't want much, but says, "My bucket list is getting longer, and my life is getting shorter."

Condo Landscape Committee





The Committee met on Tuesday, October 8th with our Brightview representative Jean Jung and her manager Glenn Fritts, who is very familiar with Highland Park from his years at

Willamette Landscape.

We briefly discussed proposals we are considering for 2020, our drainage issues, and replacement plant and tree selections. The main topic discussed was weed control. 2019 was a very bad weed year and many Owners noticed. Brightview uses a generic version of Round Up, which contains Glyphosate, for weed killing. Both Committee Members and other Owners have expressed very strong concerns about this product.

After discussion and research, the Committee decided to stop use of this herbicide and asked Brightview to offer alternatives with pricing, which they did. One option is to have Brightview workers do only hand weeding with no chemicals at all. That option would add nearly \$12K a year to our landscape contract because of the labor involved. The second option would use a product called CheetahPro, plus more frequent post and pre-emergent applications and more hand weeding than is currently done. This version adds \$5K to our landscape budget. Ed Salzman obtained a bid from Pro Maintenance to hand weed the planted beds in 2020. The Board accepted this proposal at the October Board meeting which will save the COA approximately \$1,000 per year.

The next Committee Meeting will be November 12th at 10:30 a.m. Please join us. We always welcome and need additional volunteers.

Our rainy season, or "Autumn", is when the leaves fall. Oh, and if you find yourself going out for walks after dark - it sure is getting dark early - you should carry a flashlight and wear bright, reflective clothing. That will help scare the Leopard Slugs away, too.

The pace of ALC activity is slowing just a bit, but we still have lots going on. Close to 20 new street trees will be planted in November to replace diseased trees removed earlier this year. We're also looking to get the creek bed cleaned out, and get some dead trees removed by the bridge, too (and also get some traction strips installed on the bridge). We still have some other street-tree maintenance and shrub removals happening, as well.

Finally, as a reminder, the HOA Board has approved the 2019 edition of the Architecture & Landscape Manual. Digital copies are available for download at highlands55.org/alc. Paper copies are available from the Office, or from the ALC literature rack in the Clubhouse hallway.

King City Community Talk

Numerous projects around the City are endina. 131st Avenue finished, and radar speed signs and crosswalk lights were to be delivered and installed in October. The Fischer Road final elements of the enhancement project is being completed there. By the end of October, a complete enhanced transportation network from 99W to 131st and Fischer to Beef Bend is expected.

The City is partnering with Tigard, Sherwood, Tualatin, and Washington County to raise awareness and bring attention to the traffic congestion on 99W. They are hoping to secure funding to conduct a 99W Corridor Study. The goal will be to take a holistic view of the 99W corridor and try to develop solutions to the traffic congestion along the corridor. Efforts to raise attention to the issue have resulted in the project being elevated from a Tier 2 priority to a Tier 1 priority. Regardless of the elevated status, funding for the project remains unconfirmed.

A new electronic speed sign for use in educating motorists was purchased and it will be around King City Neighborhoods. Like the one on Fischer Rd—it's mounted to an existing pole and is very bright. This sign will collect speed data and the information from that will be used in future speed and traffic impact studies. August Portland Residential Highlights: According to the Regional Multiple Listing Service pending sales saw the sole gain this August in the Portland metro area. There were 2,929 pending sales, a 6.1% increase over the 2,760 offers accepted last year in August 2018, but falling 2.3% short of the 2,998 offers accepted last month in July 2019. Closed sales, at 2,901, decreased 2.2% from the 2,967 closings recorded in August 2018 and fell 1.5% short of the 2,944 closings from July 2019. New listings (3,757) fared similarly, ending 10.8% lower than in August 2018 (4,214) and 5.3% lower than last month in July 2019 (3,966). Total market time rose by five days in August to end at 48 days. Inventory held steady at 2.3 months. Year to Date Summary: Activity is a bit cooler so far in 2019 compared with 2018. New listings (30,458) are down 0.9%, pending sales (21,585) are down 1.1% and closed sales (19,902) are down 3.3%. Average and Median Sale Prices: Comparing 2019 to 2018 through August, the average sale price has increased 1.0% from \$454,500 to \$458,900. In the same comparison, the median sale price has increased 2.2% from \$401,000 to \$410,000.
