#### Condo Board Message

Owners representing 32 Condo Units were present, and with the addition of the proxy's submitted, the required quorum was reached to hold a valid Annual Meeting.

Outgoing Chair, Ed Salzman, reported on the Board's accomplishments in 2019, including resolution of the smoking ban in Condo Units, and acknowledgement of Shel Siegel's light Condo maintenance work done throughout the year, as well as noting upcoming projects for the new Board to address in 2020. Those projects identified for 2020 are:

- Garage door repairs, 35 are left.
- Nine more decks to repair by Structural Waterproofing
- Possibly changing entry door locks to a handle type.
- Determine who to assess and repair the water shut-off valves that are rusted.
   An overall evaluation is needed of the entire complex to identify the extent of the problem.

Ed gave thank you gifts to those Condo Residents who have assisted beyond the call of duty throughout 2019. Those being

honored were Shel Siegel, Valerie Spirit, Zoe Allen, and Sandy Bergeron, Thank you all!

After adjournment of the Annual Meeting, there was a short meeting of the new Board, who selected its officers: Sherry Kilpatrick, Chairperson; Pat Barcroft, Secretary; Wayne Staley, Treasurer; Ron Laande, Director; and Zoe Allen, Director.

Acknowledgement to HOA Board Members who were present at both COA meetings: Mike Dahlstrom, HOA President and Dave Platt, HOA Director. Mike promised more cooperation and collaboration between the HOA and COA Boards and organizations. The new COA Board appreciated this effort to reach out.

Remember, the Condos are part of the King City Highlands Community! If you attended the Condos Annual Meeting,

these name tags were available for those who already have them and the form to request a name tag was available at the meeting.

Name tags are made for any Highlands Resident who wants one. It started with those who attended events, meetings, or gatherings. A Request Form is on a clipboard on the shelf of the cabinet in the Clubhouse Information Hallway. You may <u>PRINT</u> your information on it at any time, and a name tag will be made for you.

The name tag project resulted from the desire to reduce costs of continued purchases of stick-on tags. The permanent name tags <u>remain at the Clubhouse</u> and are kept in containers on the cabinet shelf, next to the clipboard. They help fellow Residents get to know each other, especially as a lot of new people have moved in to our Community this past year,

#### Reminder: Smoking Ban



Everyone received notification of our new smoking policy late last year. In case you somehow didn't hear about it, Highland

Park Condos is now a 100% non-smoking property with just one exception.

When this rule was ratified, Owners of record who also smoke can continue to smoke, but only inside their unit. Those owners may not use fans to expel smoke into the building's front entrance stairwell or use fans to blow the smoke out onto the back deck or patio. Blowing smoke out windows into the common areas is also not allowed.

Second-hand smoke can be very dangerous to people with certain health issues and is just plain annoying to others.

Condominium Residents who live on the lower level are responsible to clean their dryer vents every two years.

There are several vendors who provide this service; some vendors also service upper level dryer vents. If you were a Resident the last time this was required, and you wish to go ahead and schedule your dryer vent cleaning on your own, check with whoever provided your service the last time. If you are new to KC Highlands, Mabel Weber in the Clubhouse Office has a list of vendors who have been used in the past for this work.

Alternatively, our COA Board is researching to get a group discount by doing multiple cleanings over one or two days—saving a vendor time and hopefully reducing Homeowner costs of those who choose to participate. If you want to go with a group discount that the COA Board will coordinate, contact Sherry Kilpatrick at <a href="mailto:sherryk8888@gmail.com">sherryk8888@gmail.com</a> or (503) 452-4688. The Board can then let those individuals know the vendor selected and possible dates to schedule the cleaning, which will likely be done in April.

All owners need to provide documentation that this cleaning has occurred by providing a copy of your receipt to Mabel. This servicing provides a safer environment for us all.

#### Condo Landscape Committee

tee met February 11th. with our Brightview rep, Jean Jung. She gave a full report regarding what has been completed, e.g., leaf removal, per-

ennial and grass cut back, winter shrub pruning, and drainage repairs—garage #10 and behind buildings 16 & 17. Jean was advised that drainage for this year is done unless something unexpected, or an emergency, arises. Mulching proposals have been received from Bark Dusters and Rexius. Application will probably happen in late April after spring weed removal is complete.

Irrigation inspection was done February 11th and 12th and minor repairs can be done as preauthorized. Anything major to be done in spring will be quoted.

Discussions were held regarding continued and upcoming tree pruning, and some plants after blooms are finished. Lime inspections were done, and the soil pH was such that it does not need to be done this year, at a savings of \$2,000 to the budget.

Pre- and post-emergent weed control has been cancelled from the *Brightview* contract. Further discussion is needed regarding taking care of that issue moving forward.

Future items to be considered: updating irrigation controller options; shrub enhancements; refurbishment of mature/aging shrubs, and requests for more, and smaller trees to be planted.

The next Committee Meeting will be on Tuesday, March 10th at 10:30 a.m. in the Clubhouse Card Room. We always welcome additional Committee Members and everyone is invited to attend the meetings. Come join us!

February—March is definitely a quieter time of the year. When considerina projects around the neighborhood (both with individual Homeowners and from the Associa-

tions), not too much activity is going on. You may think the same thing when looking at the landscaped spaces around our Community—but look closer! There are lots of buds on the shrubs and trees, the leaves are starting to pop, and as of this writing in mid-February, there are already tons of crocuses, daffodils, and even fruit trees in full bloom!

From the human-project side of the ALC's ledger, we've finally gotten the long-delayed concrete repairs wrapped up, and we'll soon have some new "growth" on the brick wall at the corner of Dickson and 131st Avenue.

What am I talking about? The new sign at our southern entrance! The sign company currently has plans to install the new Highlands sign in early March—keep your eyes open for that. 

#### **Update: Backflow Testing for Houses**

As many of you Submitted by Mabel Weber may know, the State of Oregon requires all house owners who have and use underground sprinklers to have their backflow valve tested annually. If the valve malfunctions, it would be a health issue for both you and your neighbors.

Thank you to our House Residents for your patience in waiting for information about this spring's backflow valve testing. Highlands House Residents will receive a discount on your testing if you use *PM Backflow Company*. After the test is completed, they will submit the necessary paperwork to the Tigard Water Department.

This year, PM Backflow is sending e-mail notifications to all Residents who used their service last year, informing you that they are ready to begin the testing. You will receive a code that will give the 2020 Highlands discount. They only accept computer "online" sign-ups with payment by credit card. Residents who are not computer savvy may come to the Clubhouse Office and Mabel can help you. Please bring your credit card.

Because we have a lot of new Residents who did not use PM Backflow's service last year and will not receive the e-mail, you will need to watch for a Hi-net notice that the code has been received in the Clubhouse Office. I can either send you the code or you may call the Office (503) 684-8294, or come in to apply.

When the backflow testing is in process, you'll see a man in an orange vest working in your neighborhood.

At this writing, I have not heard back from PM Back-flow with the discount code. I do expect to receive an e-mail sometime in early March. Please continue to be patient. When you do receive the notice, be sure to sign up immediately so you don't lose your discount.

The State of Oregon Construction Contractor's Board (CCB) does have regulations in place for certain work, but most important, they have processes in place that protect the home/condo owner by licensed contractors if the work is not done to your satisfaction. There are many unlicensed contractor/handymen working all over the State. While they may quote a very low rate at times, they may not be such a bargain when the work is unsatisfactory, or they can't be contacted after work completion.

Oregon law requires individuals or businesses conducting construction/repair activities over \$1,000 per project to be licensed by the CCB. This financially and legally protects BOTH the home/condo owner and the contractor/handyman. Should problems or disagreements arise with the quality of the work or damage to property, the CCB has a process in place that ensures that the home/condo owner and the contractor can achieve an agreeable solution.

It is important to note that not all contractor/ handymen need to be licensed by the State. Work such as gutter cleaning, power and pressure washing for the purpose of cleaning (siding, sidewalks, etc.), debris clean-up (yard or construction site), and qualified real estate property managers managing a building under a property management agreement don't need a license. Neither do those doing land-scaping such as mowing, edging, shrubs and tree pruning, weeding, refreshing bark mulch, adjusting sprinkler heads, programming irrigation controllers, and planting of outdoor pots.

In conclusion, please be aware of who you hire to do work. Ask if they are licensed. Most common landscaping work doesn't require licenses. Beyond that kind of routine work, however, look for CCB licensed contractors to protect you and ensure the work is done that meets applicable codes and you have a resource to turn to if the work is not done satisfactorily. Equipment has been installed at all three planned intersections of 99W at Hall Blvd., 72nd Ave., and Durham Rd. However, all cameras have been turned off until construction permit standards required by ODOT are met. The systems will remain off and no citations will be issued until the contractor has completed the work necessary at each intersection. Once a final ODOT inspection is completed and an intersection is authorized to go back online, the City will communicate further.


The City of Tigard has installed camera equipment to make intersections safer for motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists. Running red lights has been identified as the leading cause of urban crashes according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety. Similar to neighboring jurisdictions that use this technology, Tigard expects to see significant reductions in red-light violations that have been historically problematic at these intersections.



# Groundhog Day Prediction For Spring

Punxsutawney Phil was pulled from his burrow in Gobbler's Knob Sunday morning February 2<sup>nd</sup>, and did not see his shadow, which, according to legend, means an early spring and warmer temperatures. But even the organizers of the annual Groundhog Day event in western Pennsylvania acknowledge that turning to a large rodent for weather forecasting is mostly a way to break up winter monotony.

Thousands of people stayed out in the cold to watch Phil's handlers pull him from a big tree stump about 7:25 a.m. Sunday, February 2nd. Then a top-hatted man—one of the Inner Circle—read Phil's scroll: "So do I hope you think it's neighborly, for there is no shadow of me. Spring will be early, it's a certainty."

The denizens of Punxsutawney have celebrated Groundhog Day since 1887. The tradition was brought over by German immigrants. Since that first gathering, Punxsutawney Phil (there has been a few since then) has predicted more winter 104 times, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Counting this year, he hasn't seen his shadow 20 times. Some records are missing but since 2009, according to the NOAA, Phil's predictions have been right only about 40% of the time.


